Sheikh Thambi Pavalur (1874–1950)

Sheikh Thambi Pavalur, born in Edalakudy, Nagercoil, was a Tamil poet, scholar, and freedom fighter. He was a disciple of Sankaranarayana Pattariar and was well-versed in 'Kamba Ramayana'. In 1907, he performed the 'Sathavathanam' Programme in Madras Victoria Town Hall, impressing scholars like V. Kalyanasundaram (Thiru. Vi. Ka). His literary works include 'Kottatru Pillai Tamil' and 'Seerapuram'. In 2008, a commemorative postage stamp was released in his honor.

P. Jeevanandham (1907–1963)

P. Jeevanandham, born in Boothapandi, was a social reformer, political leader, and one of the pioneers of the Communist and socialist movements in Tamil Nadu. He was a supporter of the pure usage of Tamil and was influenced by the works of poet Subramania Bharati. Jeevanandham translated Bhagat Singh's essay "Why I am an Atheist" into Tamil in 1933. He was also the founder of the Tamil literary magazine 'Thamara' and the Communist Tamil newspaper 'Jana Sakthi'.

A. Nesamony (1895–1968)

A. Nesamony was a prominent leader who played a crucial role in the merger of the Tamil-speaking areas of Travancore with Tamil Nadu. He was a member of the Travancore Tamil Nadu Congress (TTNC) and later integrated with the Indian National Congress. Known for his advocacy for the Tamil language and culture, Nesamony served in various administrative and educational capacities, including as Chairman of the Nagercoil Municipal Council and President of the Nagercoil Bar Association.

S. S. Viswanatha Das (1886–1940)

S. S. Viswanatha Das was a playwright, actor, and freedom fighter who used his art to advocate for Indian independence. He incorporated nationalist themes into his theatrical productions and promoted Indian independence through art. His plays, which included depictions of figures like Lord Muruga and Harischandra, were infused with messages opposing British rule. Das was a member of the Indian National Congress and faced multiple arrests due to his activism.

N. Subramanian (1900–?)

N. Subramanian was a prominent figure during the Quit India Movement in 1942. He organized student strikes, hartals, and public meetings in Nagercoil. Subramanian was arrested by the Travancore police and detained for his involvement in the movement. His dedication to the cause of independence reflects the spirit of resistance in Kanyakumari District during British rule.

Vanchinathan (1886–1908)

Vanchinathan was a revolutionary who assassinated a British official, Robert Ashe, in 1908 in the railway station at Maniyachi. This act of defiance against British rule made him a martyr and a symbol of resistance. The railway station was later renamed Vanchi Maniyachchi Junction in his honor, and a memorial was inaugurated in 2013 at his birthplace in Sengottai.

M. R. Gandhi (1919–2013)

M. R. Gandhi was a prominent leader in Kanyakumari District who played a significant role in the establishment of the Bharatiya Jana Sangh and the Rashtriya Swayamsevak Sangh in the region. He served as the district president of Jana Sangh in 1967 and as the Tamil Nadu state secretary of the party in 1975. Gandhi was also jailed during The Emergency and later served as the Tamil Nadu state BJP vice-president.

The contributions of these unsung heroes from Kanyakumari District have been pivotal in shaping the region's role in India's independence movement. Their activism, whether through literature, politics, art, or direct action, has left an indelible mark on the socio-political landscape of Tamil Nadu.
