In **Gunungkidul, Yogyakarta (Indonesia)**, the local public library redefined its mission by focusing on community development. Beyond lending books, it offered **vocational training in batik-making, sewing, digital marketing, and business management**. The aim was to preserve cultural traditions while equipping residents—especially women and youth—with skills to generate income. This model demonstrates how libraries can align with broader goals of sustainability and economic self-reliance, especially in rural or economically disadvantaged settings.

4. Pandemic Response & Social Services

The **COVID-19 pandemic** forced libraries worldwide to adapt quickly. In India, the NGO-run **READ India libraries** pivoted their services by providing **digital literacy training**, distributing **oximeters and blood pressure monitors**, and offering health and hygiene awareness programs. Similarly, the **Bansa Community Library in Hardoi, Uttar Pradesh** took on an active relief role—distributing masks, ration kits, and other essentials. These actions underline the ability of libraries to function as **first-response centers** in times of crisis, leveraging their community trust and physical infrastructure.

5. Innovative Literacy Outreach

In states like **Maharashtra**, grassroots library workers use storytelling as a tool for social change. A notable example involves read-aloud sessions of the children's book *"My Name is Gulab"*, which touches on the lives of manual scavengers. These sessions spark community discussions on caste-based discrimination and inspire **behavioral changes like waste segregation**. As reported by **FactorDaily**, this innovative approach transforms passive reading into active learning and community reflection.

6. Community Engagement Models

A recent study published in the **South India Journal of Social Sciences** assessed the role of public libraries in **Kannur, Kerala**, and found that libraries increasingly function as **community interaction spaces**. Programs like youth discussion forums, health workshops, and women's literacy groups have fostered inclusiveness. Importantly, the study highlighted

Suggestions

1. Expand Digital & ICT Services

In an increasingly digital world, access to technology is fundamental for full participation in education, employment, and government services. Public libraries, especially in underserved rural and semi-urban areas, must bridge the digital divide by providing **free Wi-Fi, public computers, digital catalogs, and access to online learning platforms**. The case of **Kannur Public Libraries in Kerala** revealed growing demand for ICT infrastructure and digital literacy training. By transforming into **digital resource centers**, libraries can facilitate e-learning, job applications, online transactions, and even remote healthcare access. Partnerships with local governments and tech firms can support infrastructure upgrades and maintenance.

2. Transform Libraries into Crisis Response Centers

The COVID-19 pandemic showcased the **critical role of libraries as emergency support hubs**. In places like **Hardoi (Uttar Pradesh)** and **READ India libraries**, libraries were repurposed to distribute health kits, ration supplies, and disseminate vital public health information.

To institutionalize this role, libraries should be included in **local disaster preparedness and response planning**. Staff can be trained in crisis communication and basic health services. Libraries can also serve as **information centers during floods, heatwaves, or political unrest**, ensuring the public stays informed and connected. Funding for emergency equipment and communication tools will further strengthen this capacity.

3. Promote Mobile & Pop-Up Library Models

In many remote or marginalized communities, **fixed-location libraries are inaccessible**. Mobile libraries—such as vans, book carts, boats, or digital kiosks—are cost-effective and flexible ways to **bring knowledge directly to the people**. **Street Library Ghana** has pioneered this model, using mobile units to reach thousands of children in low-resource areas, often combining book delivery with storytelling and educational games. In India, similar initiatives like **mobile library buses in Andhra Pradesh** or **railway station book corners** have shown promising results. Government and NGO partnerships can help scale such initiatives, especially in areas affected by low literacy rates, conflict, or migration.

Libraries must actively dismantle barriers that prevent equitable access to knowledge. Libraries should **not merely serve communities—they should be shaped by them**. Additionally, **partnering with local NGOs, schools, and artists** can help libraries function as collaborative civic spaces where diverse voices and needs are addressed. Modern public libraries can become **informal training centers**, especially for those with limited access to formal education or employment pathways. An inspiring example is the **Gunungkidul Public Library in Yogyakarta, Indonesia**, which provides training in batik-making, online marketing, and digital entrepreneurship.
